The publishers don't make it very easy to see what's new in the second edition. Based on my initial examination, there is the following:* "1917" (Bois) is split into two chapters, one on Mondrian's Neoplasticism (1917a) and one on de De Stijl journal (1917b).* "1925c" (Foster) on Schlemmer's "Theater of the Bauhaus," the mannequin, the automaton, the doll and the puppet, Emmy Hennings, Hannah Hoech, and Sophie Taeuber.* "1928b" (Bois) on Tschichold's Die neue Typographie.* "1931b" (Krauss) on Miro, Calder and Bataille. (The concluding list of further references doesn't include Charles Palermo's book.)* "1937c" (Buchloh) on Guernica.

This book is very thorough and the authors are really heavy in art theory. At times it is tough to understand and the text could be simplified for better understanding. But even then I still learned a lot from this and have a greater appreciation for modern art. The book is also unbiased when explaining the various politics that influenced art during this time.
