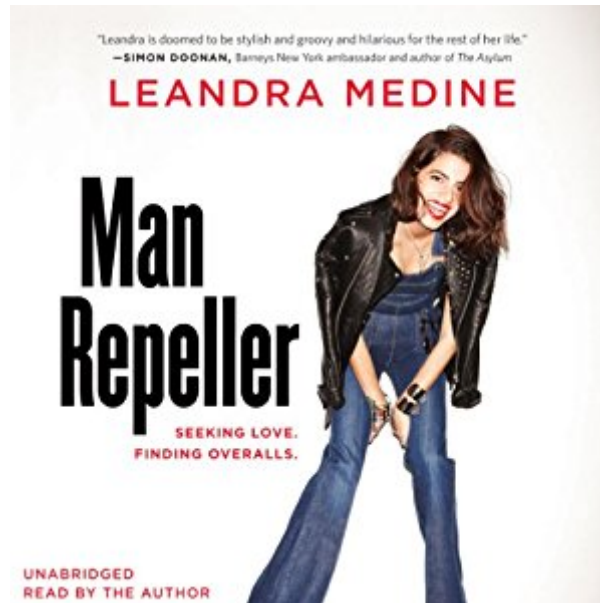

The Man Repeller was probably the first hugely popular fashion blog. I was an intermittent reader at best because, even though her aesthetic didn't appeal to me, the concept of embracing your

personal style even if it repels men was kind of funny. This is not a style guide, but rather a fashion biography of sorts where Medine uses articles of clothing as chapter titles and jumping off points to tell the high points (mainly surrounding love) of her life thus far. Her sometimes wacky "I Love Lucy" style anecdotes that take her from her first crush in elementary school to joining the adult job market are at once endearing and annoying in a Carrie Bradshaw kind of way. Medine's clear devotion to fashion are what kept me reading long after I decided that I couldn't relate to her at all.

Leandra is so unique because, while she thrives in an industry with a tendency to take itself too seriously, her love of fashion goes beyond image-building, snootiness or pure self-indulgence. Clothes are her medium and she interacts with them as an artist -- you can tell by how she connects feelings and memories so directly with her favorite pieces. Plus she's a great storyteller, unafraid to poke fun at herself and funny as hell.

I'm a huge fan of Leandra's blog. So, when the opportunity came to review her book, I jumped at it. While parts were funny and relatable (which is why I love her blog), the book left something to be desired. Unfortunately, I can't pinpoint exactly what "something" is, but I can say that you'll enjoy many of the anecdotes and empathetically cringe at times. I don't think the book is worth buying for more than 4.99 on Kindle though. I received a free copy in exchange for an honest review.

I enjoyed this book a lot more than I thought I would. It was less a "how to girl boss" type book and

more of just an interesting/entertaining collection of stories. It's well done and I appreciate her sense of humor and writing style.

I didn't know much about her before this book. Now I think she is brilliant and hilarious. I've never been hugely into the Man Repeller blog, but the concept of this book appealed to me so I gave it a try on Audible. I appreciate the way the book is formatted where each life event is tied to a particular item of clothing, very different from other young women's memoirs I've read recently. There were parts that were so funny they had me in tears, and there were parts that just made me cry.
