

The Della Robbia studio produced dazzling multicolored ornaments for major Florentine buildings, delicately modeled and ingeniously constructed freestanding statues, serene blue-and-white devotional reliefs for domestic use, charming portraits of children and commanding busts of rulers, along with decorative and liturgical objects. Important patrons from the Medici family to the French court enhanced the reputation of the Della Robbia style and technique, which in turn inspired imitation by rival artists. In recent years, renewed attention from art historians, backed by sophisticated technical studies, has reintegrated Della Robbia into the mainstream of Renaissance art history and illuminated the originality and accomplishments of the familyâ ™s studio, which operated into the 16th century. As a result, the choir stall is the ultimate Renaissance expression of lovingly building on the epicurean past while also pushing the boundaries of art into the future. The subject is not religious, it is humanistic, in other words the art celebrates the actual beauty of childhood itself and the actually beauty of the craft that captures the beauty of childhood. The love Della Robbia has for the mystery of childhood, for the tenderness of a childâ [™]s vulnerability, and for the sheer joy of that stage of lifeâ "when all activities are undertaken with earnest sincerity a "is stunningly true to life in the frieze.
